Children are beginning to have 'Spirals' I:I conversations with their teachers. The children will be adding to their learning journals copies of work that they are particularly proud of as well as records of whole class activities. It is an opportunity to share with their teacher what they enjoy, the challenges they have, and to establish their next steps. The learning journals form part of the children's end of year report and the conversations are more important than ever as the children continue to reconnect with their learning at school.

Next week there will be a whole school science investigation encouraging the children to think like scientists. The investigations will take place within bubbles, but we will be sharing outcomes across the school during assembly times. These investigations will support teachers in assessing children's skills with regard to 'thinking scientifically, as we challenge the children to ask questions, create experiments, test theories and reflect on the outcomes.


